## A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR

Over the past few months, as we have been upgrading our camera system in the sanctuary for our live streaming of worship, the topic of audio-visual projection for the sanctuary has emerged again. Not having been the pastor the last time this conversation came up, I wanted to share some thoughts that might guide our thinking and discernment together.

Over thousands of years, Christian worship has been about the presence of God with us and has sought to communicate sacred content. Worship has evolved in different ages. Biblically it moved from tabernacle, to outdoor sanctuaries, a central temple, house churches, cathedrals, frontier brush arbors, sophisticated tall-steeple churches, and now even gyms! (With the high holy drum set!) Vehicles for worship change. The goal is to share sacred content. Worship has always had a visual component. The cross is our visual focal point. Stained glass windows have told the Christian story for a thousand years or more. Iconography and Christian art have also brought the narrative to life.

Technology has always changed worship. With the advent of the new technology of the printing press, a church "book-driven culture" emerged with personal Bibles, hymnals, and study books replacing oral tradition as the delivery system for the sacred. When organs made their way from opera houses and pubs to the sanctuary, some thought it was scandalous. Now, many consider organ music "sacred." With new technology, we will not lose anything (like hymnals), just add new capability.

Our delivery system and worship tools are always evolving and challenge the church to adapt. We are at one of those moments of adapting to culture and technology as a new step into a relevant future. Technology is now allowing us to make a historic move back to "Ancient-Future" worship, which is more visual by nature. For the last nine months, we have been sharing more and more electronic, media-driven worship. So, we are already evolving. It is both an opportunity and, perhaps, a gift. Our youngest generations now learn and process most of their life visually. Just as stained glass, an organ, sound systems, air conditioning, and pew cushions were added to enhance worship at some point in the past, we now have an opportunity to update and retool worship for many generations to come. Can we invest in new generations who will be in our pews twenty years from now?

I will make you a promise. Used correctly, an audio-visual projection unit can truly enhance worship, giving us visual capability for sacred imagery that allows us to capture "Ancient-Future" worship for generations to come. As your Senior Pastor, I vow that we will use the system, if adopted, for enhancing sacred content in our worship. Our Church Council will consider this matter on November 16, with the unanimous recommendation from our Trustees and approval from our Financial committee, with designated funds already in place to purchase equipment. We covet your prayers. I ask you to think of generations to come as we "retool" and re-focus on opportunities for "Ancient-Future" worship for years to come.

# **IN-PERSON WORSHIP SERVICES**

On November 1, we reopened our facility for in-person worship services. There are two options available:

- $\rightarrow$  Traditional worship in the sanctuary at 10:55 a.m.

There are no nursery services available at this time. Masks and social distancing are required at both services.

# CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS AND THE NEW NORMAL

While we are going back to in-person worship in November, we will still continue the online services as we have for the past eight months.

In addition to the morning worship services, we will be filming and putting online our traditional Advent and Christmas services: Hanging of the Greens, Lessons and Carols, Children's Christmas Music Program, and the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service.

The plans for these services are ongoing, and we will begin recording in early November. Please note:

- → Now is a great time to join in the Choir Club activities on Wednesday afternoons from 4:15 5:15 p.m. for Instrumental Classes. ALL of our singing time is on YouTube and is available to rehearse and learn the vocal numbers for the Christmas season! Choir Club notebooks with all of the music are available. - → All children and youth are welcome and encouraged to participate in The Hanging of the Greens. The Dedication segments of that service will be recorded on Wednesday, December 2 with the following schedule:
  - 5:15 6 p.m.: 3 and 4 year olds/Greenery Kindergarten and First Grade/Pew Greenery 2nd – 4th Grade/Poinsettias and Greenery
  - 6 7 p.m.: 5th 12th Grade Boys/Candles
    - 5th 12th Grade Girls
    - 5th 12th Grade/Balcony Garland

This will be the only recording session for this service. Mark your calendars now and plan to participate. Additional reminders and information will be shared between now and December 2. The Hanging of the Green Service will be available on line on December 6.

## FOOD PANTRY NEWS

God's Grace Food Pantry is the Servant Ministry focus for November. We want to begin with a big THANK YOU to our volunteers. In October, we anticipated receiving pre-packed boxes from the USDA, but that order was not filled and plans changed. Instead, we ordered from Second Harvest Food Bank, which delivered 9.300 pounds of food on Friday. October 23. Ten volunteers helped us unload and set up the garage for packing. On Monday, a group of eighteen volunteers arrived and packed bags for 400 households - in just 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours! Tuesday, October 27, was Distribution day. With the help of 17 volunteers, we served 410 households. Even though it looks different from our days in Wesley Chapel, we are still serving those in our community needing food assistance. We continue to share the story of grace in the heart of town.

When we set a dozen eggs in the front seat of an old pickup truck, the driver said, "I live by myself, but I'm going to have me a fine dinner tonight. Thank you so much and God bless you!"

That food was from YOU – the church! From that man in the pickup truck, to each and every one of you, "Thank you so much and God bless you!"

## THANKS FROM THE DISASTER RESPONSE TEAM

As you can see from the list below, this has been a very busy year for the Disaster Response Team:

- → February Jackson, MS: Pearl River Flood cleaned flooded homes for four families.
- → March Cookeville, TN: Cookeville Tornado cut trees, cleared debris, and tarped roofs for twenty families.
- → April Seneca, SC: Tornado cut trees and cleared debris for five families and a church
- → September Deridder, LA: Hurricane Laura cut trees, cleared debris, and tarped roofs for twelve families.
- → October Sulphur, LA: Hurricane Delta cut trees and cleared debris for six families.

On behalf of the team, I want to thank all of you for making this possible. None of this would have happened without your donations, your prayers, your encouragement, and your assistance.

Those of us who are privileged to travel with the team are blessed to meet and interact with the people we serve and to see God's love for them revealed in the things we do. Last week, in Sulphur (Louisiana), we cut a large number of trees and moved debris for a family with two young sons. The mother came to see us the following evening and brought each of us a small gift and a thank you note. I want to share that note with you. It is a tribute to your faithful support of this ministry.

Thank you for generously sharing your time and energy with us! You gave us a helping hand right when we needed it the most, and we will never forget it.

We were given a quote of \$25,000 to clean up the trees from Hurricane Laura. Then one of the trees that fell broke our water line, and we were quoted \$7,500 to replace the water line from the road to the house. Shortly before Hurricane Delta hit, my car broke, and we were told it needs a new engine, and this would be \$8,500. And those are just some highlights ...

I broke down in tears one night, and told my husband I had lost all hope. The weight of losing so much in two months was too much to carry. I told my husband I just needed a little hope, just something to hang on to.

Please know that what you have done for my family is not lost on me. I appreciate it more than you will ever know. Thank you for helping to ease the burden in our recovery process and giving me the hope that I so prayed for.
